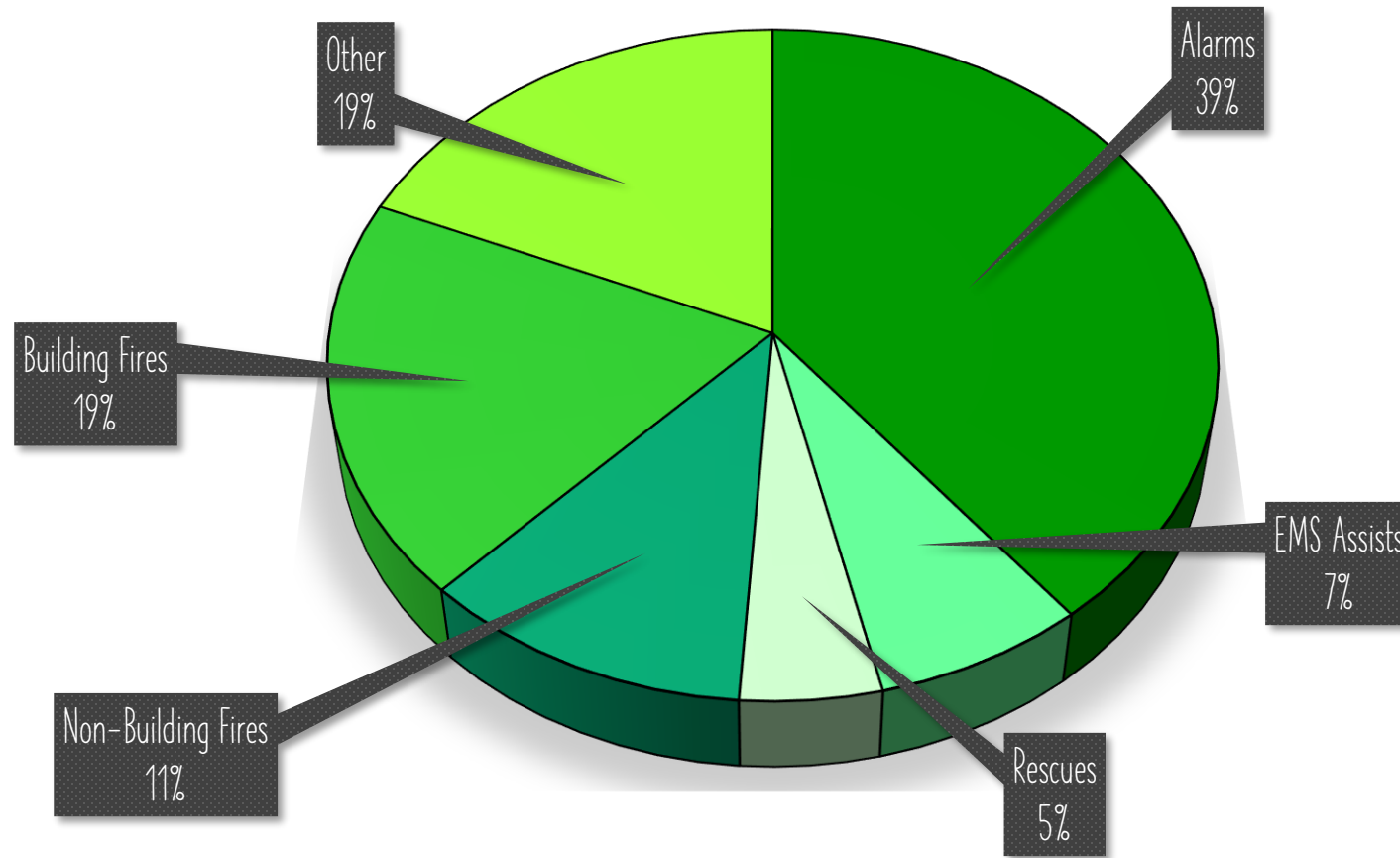


10-year Comparison of Calls for Service at BHVFC

Volunteers responded to five hundred ninety-three calls for service in 2024. This represents a 7.4% increase (+41) in call volume for the year. Similar to the last couple of years, there were no major storm events causing this increase; instead, the increase is a product of our community's increased needs.

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Calls by Dispatched Incident Type

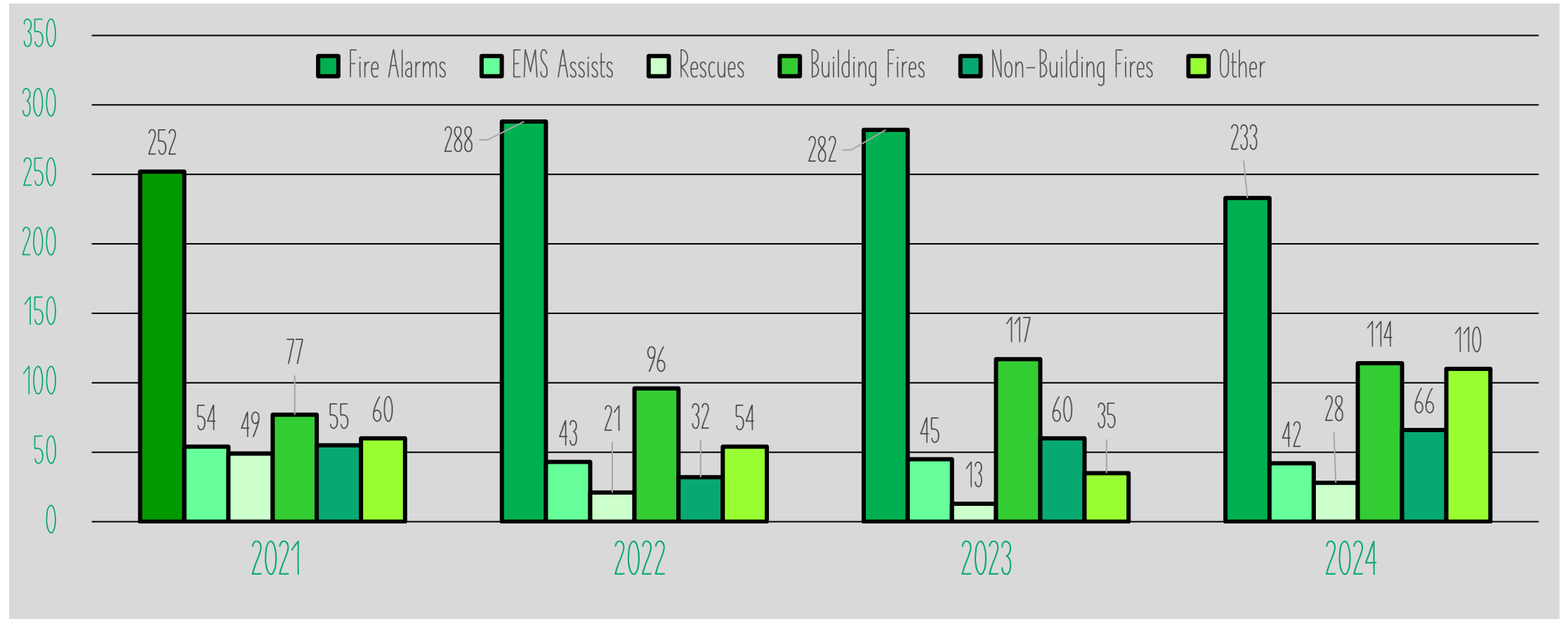


Calls for service are broken down into six (6) categories. Building Fires, Non-Building Fires, Rescues, EMS Assists, Alarm Systems, and all Others. Responses to alarm systems account for the highest percentage of responses.

Fire alarms may be activated for legitimate reasons, such as smoke from various sources, or non-legitimate reasons, such as a system malfunction. Like most utility and mechanical systems in a residence or business, it is a good practice to have your alarm system serviced annually.

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4yr Comparison – Incident Type



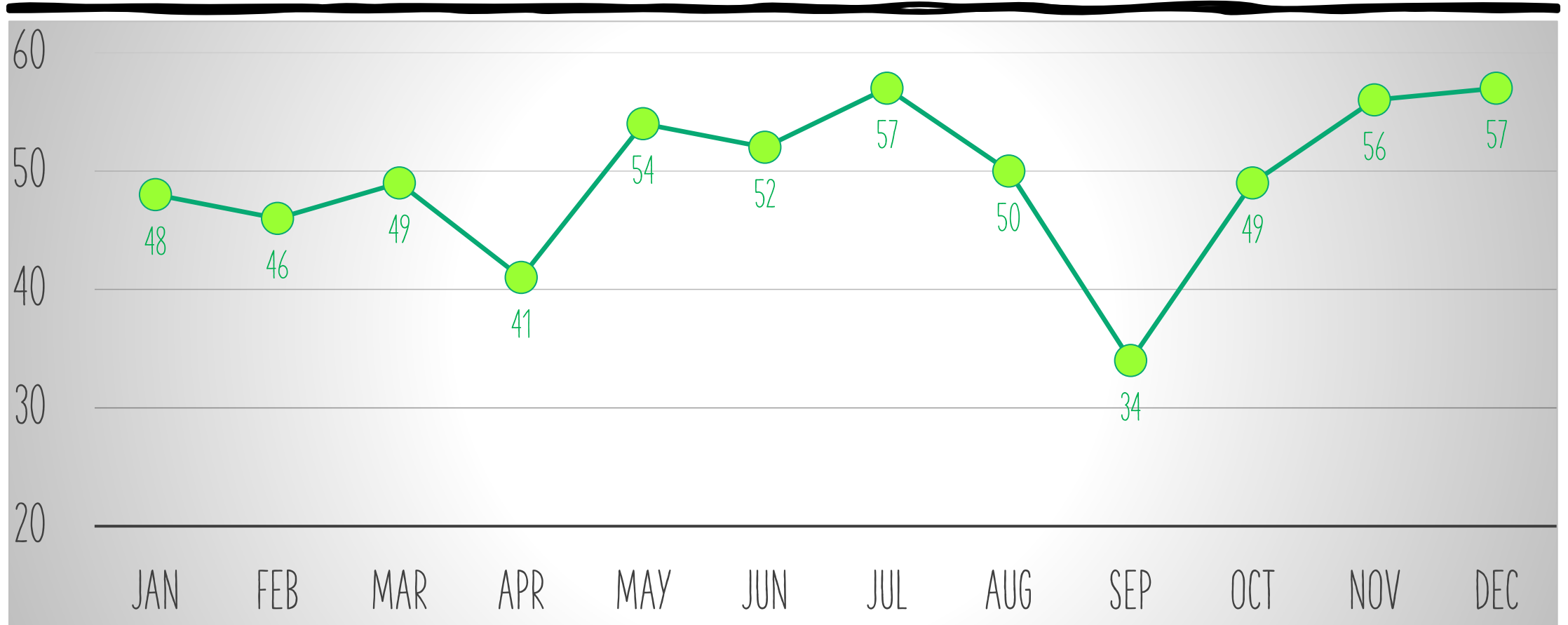

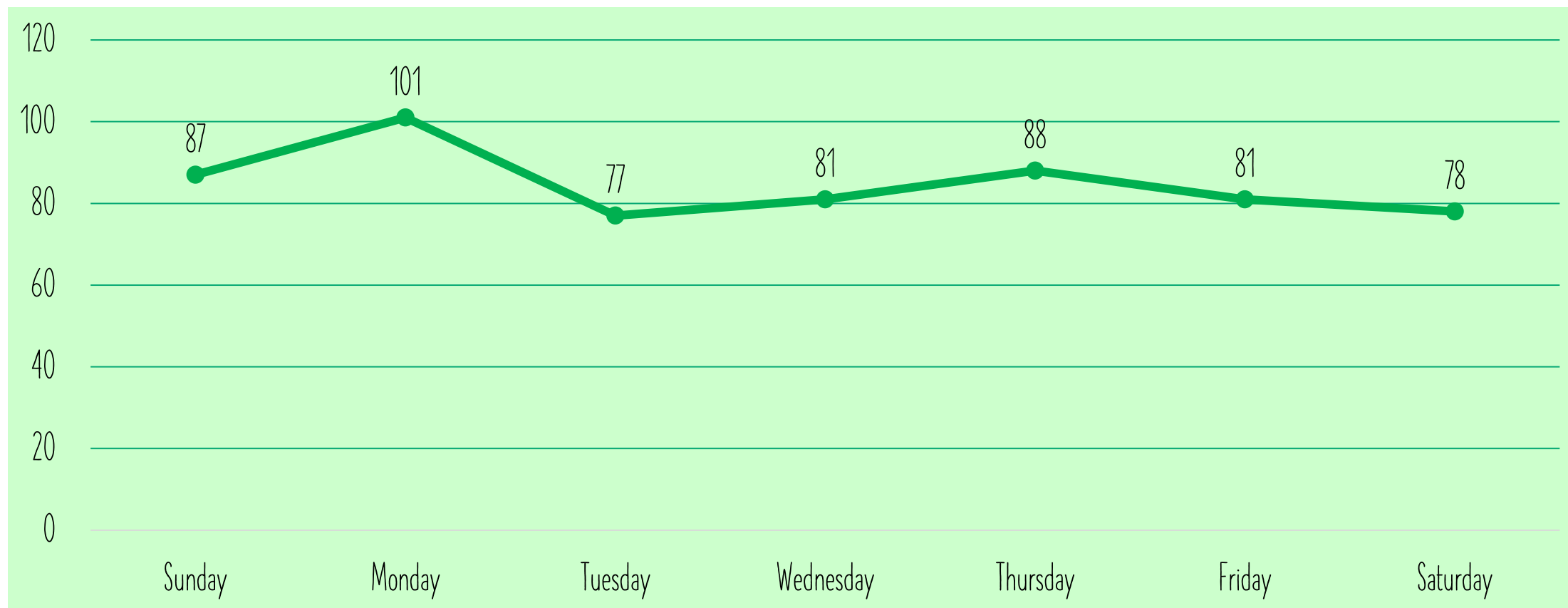
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Responses by Month



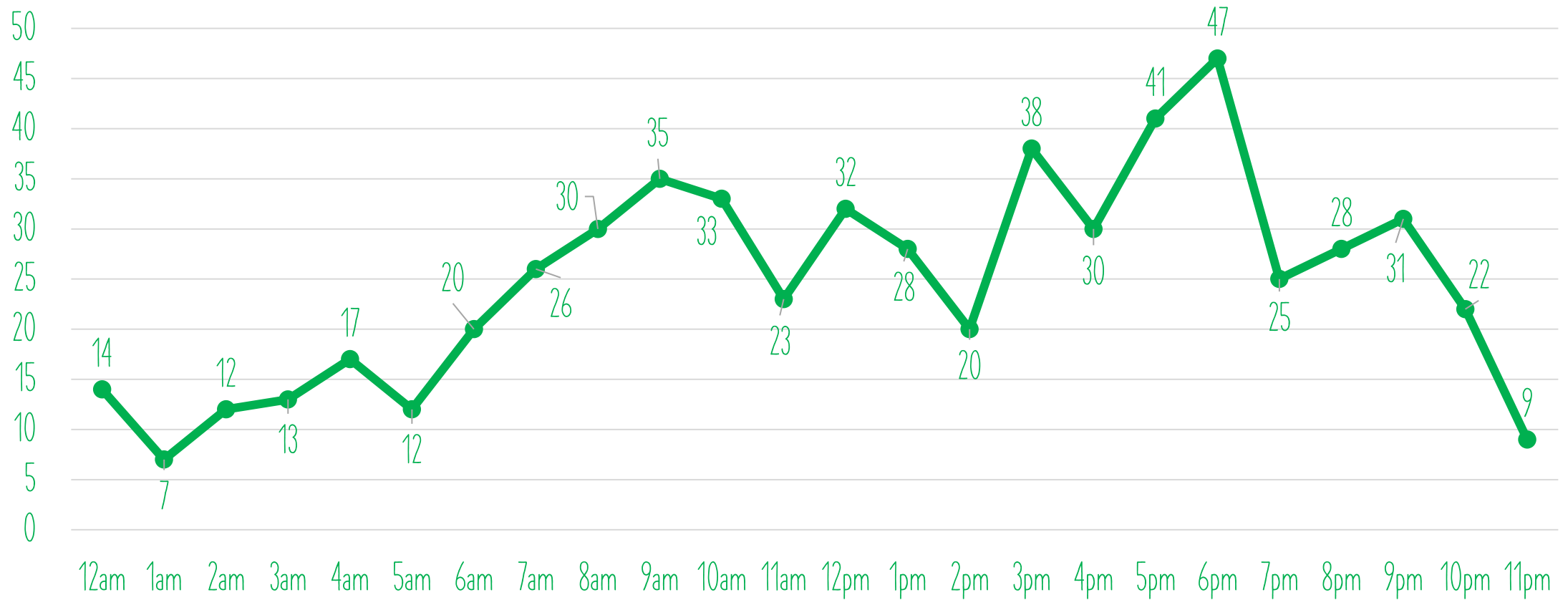
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Responses by Day of the Week



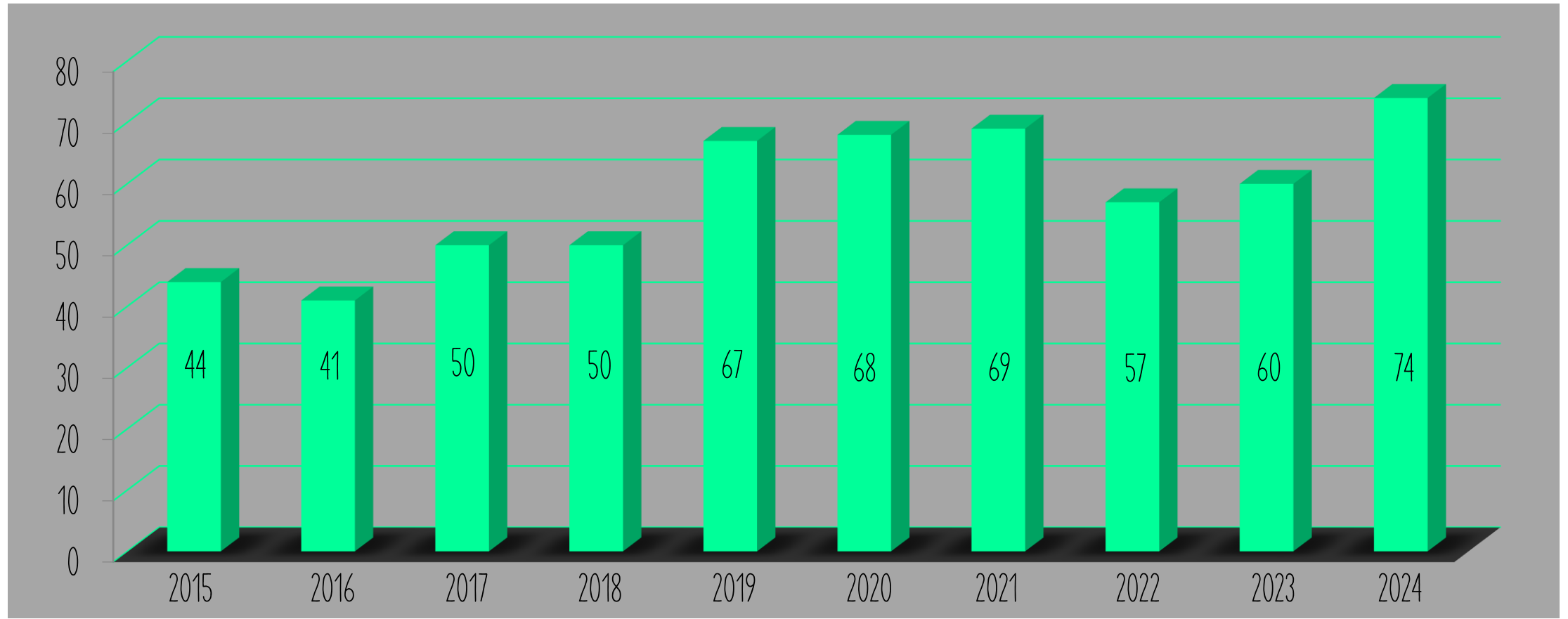
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Responses by Hour of the Day



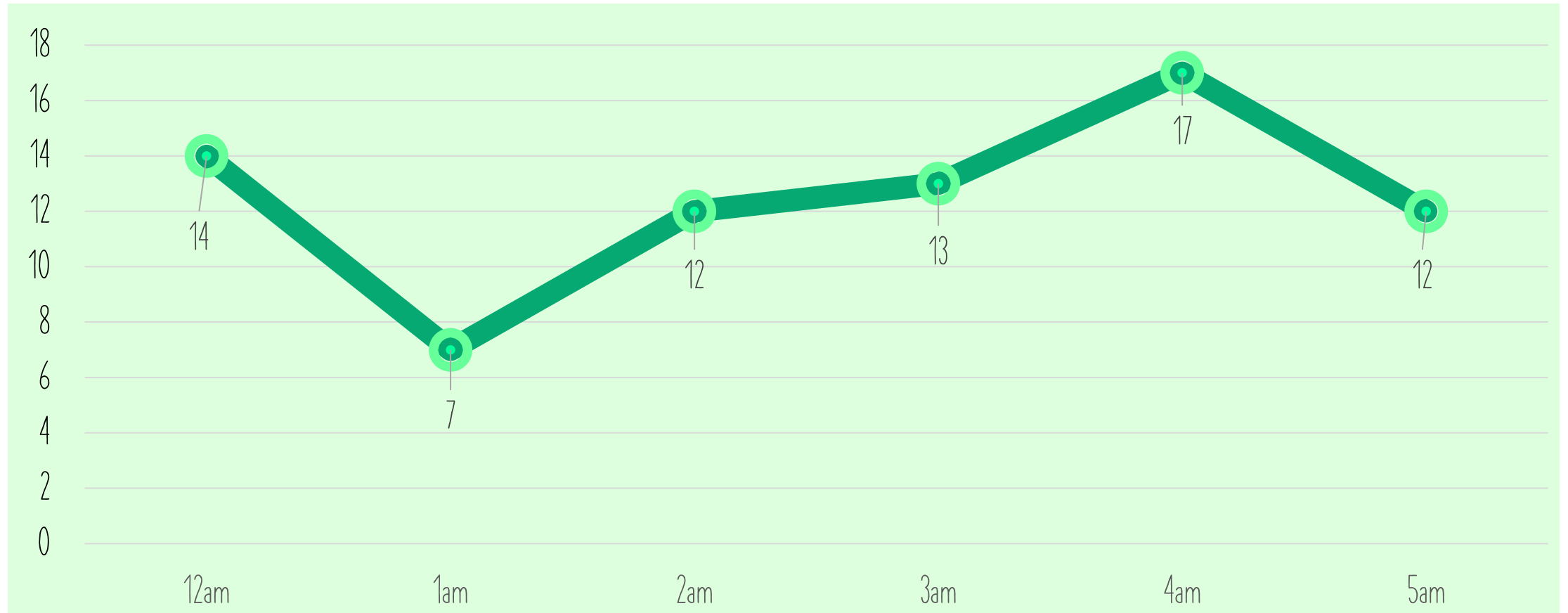
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Midnight (12a-6a) Calls for Service

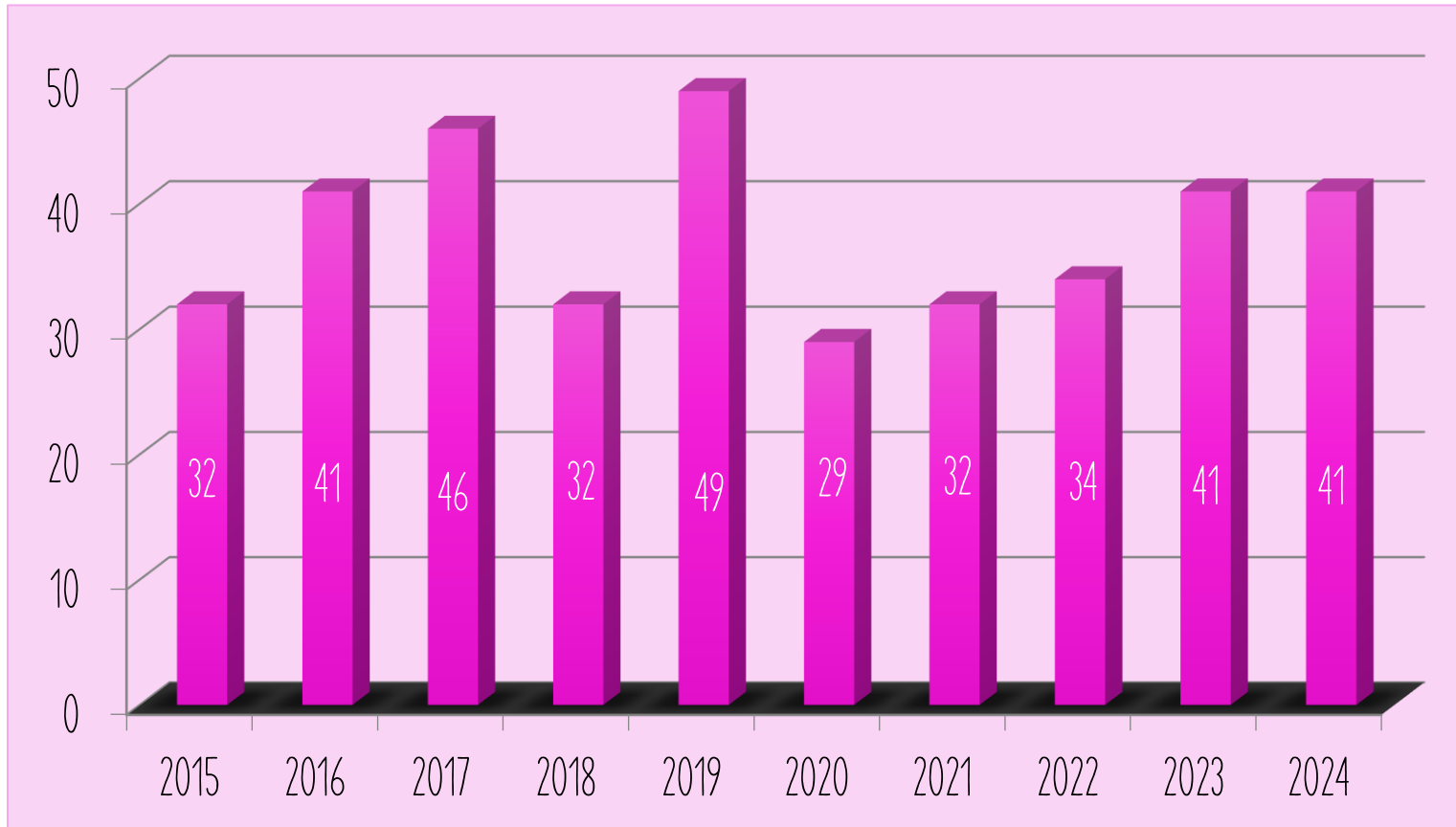

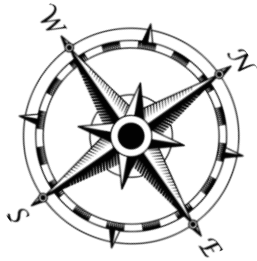
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BHVFC Fire Police Only Responses

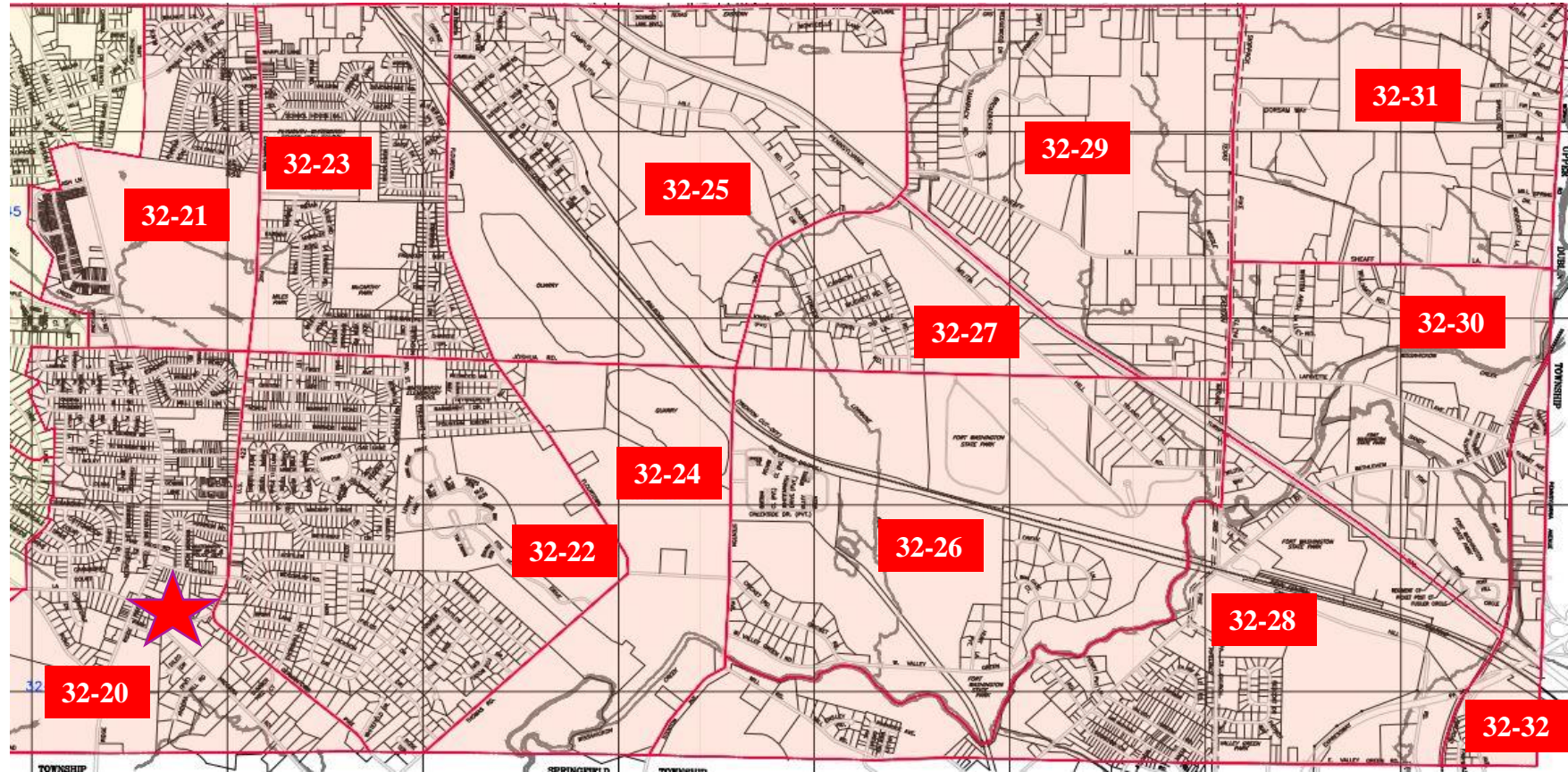


The Fire Police Unit is dispatched with the fire company on all calls for service. However, there are times they are dispatched by themselves or attend a Fire Police ONLY event where the rest of the fire company does not participate. This chart represents the annual events that the Fire Police are called to service without the full fire company response.

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Box System

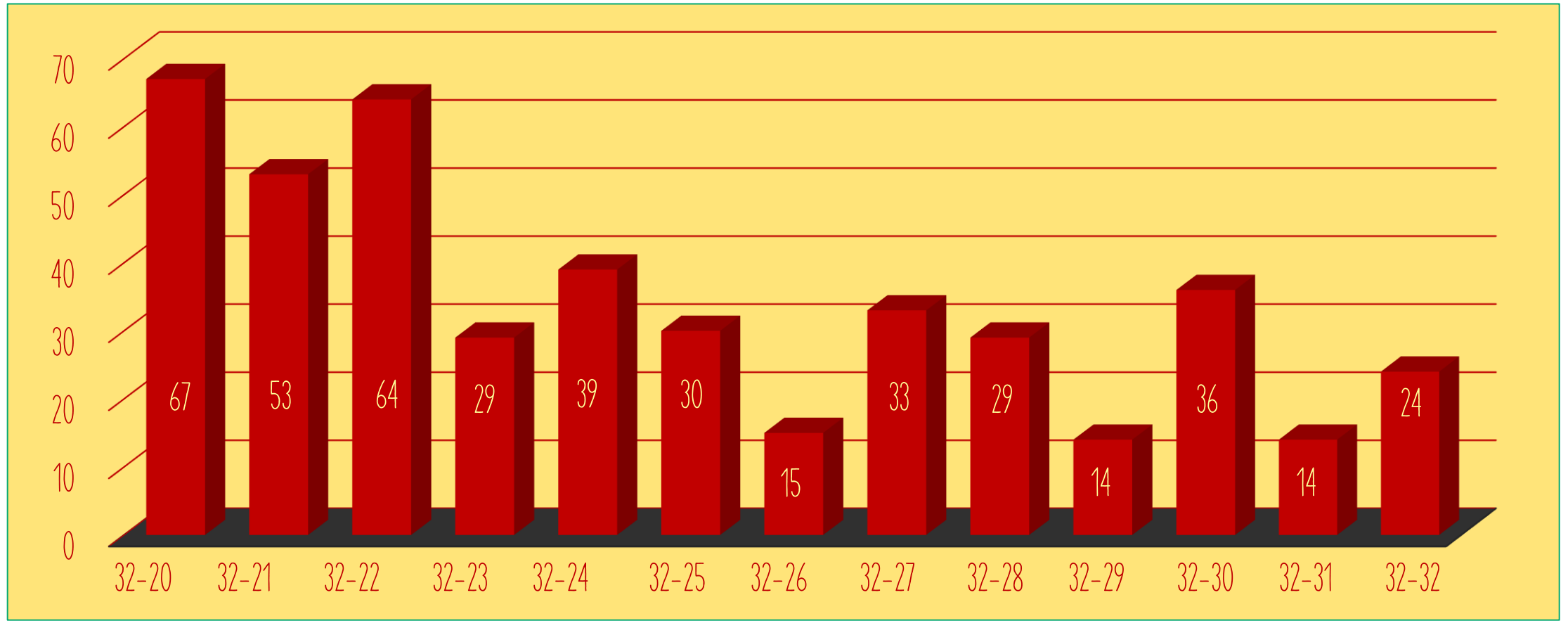


Box System

A "BOX SYSTEM" is a dispatch method that is designed to allow the closest available resources to respond to an emergency scene. Each "box" has a unique dispatch list of closest resources that are considered based on distances and response needs. BHVFC's response District contains thirteen (13) boxes. Within each box, certain addresses are identified as "target hazards." A target hazard is a location that requires special considerations for firefighting operations due to occupancy, hazardous materials, or other similar factors.

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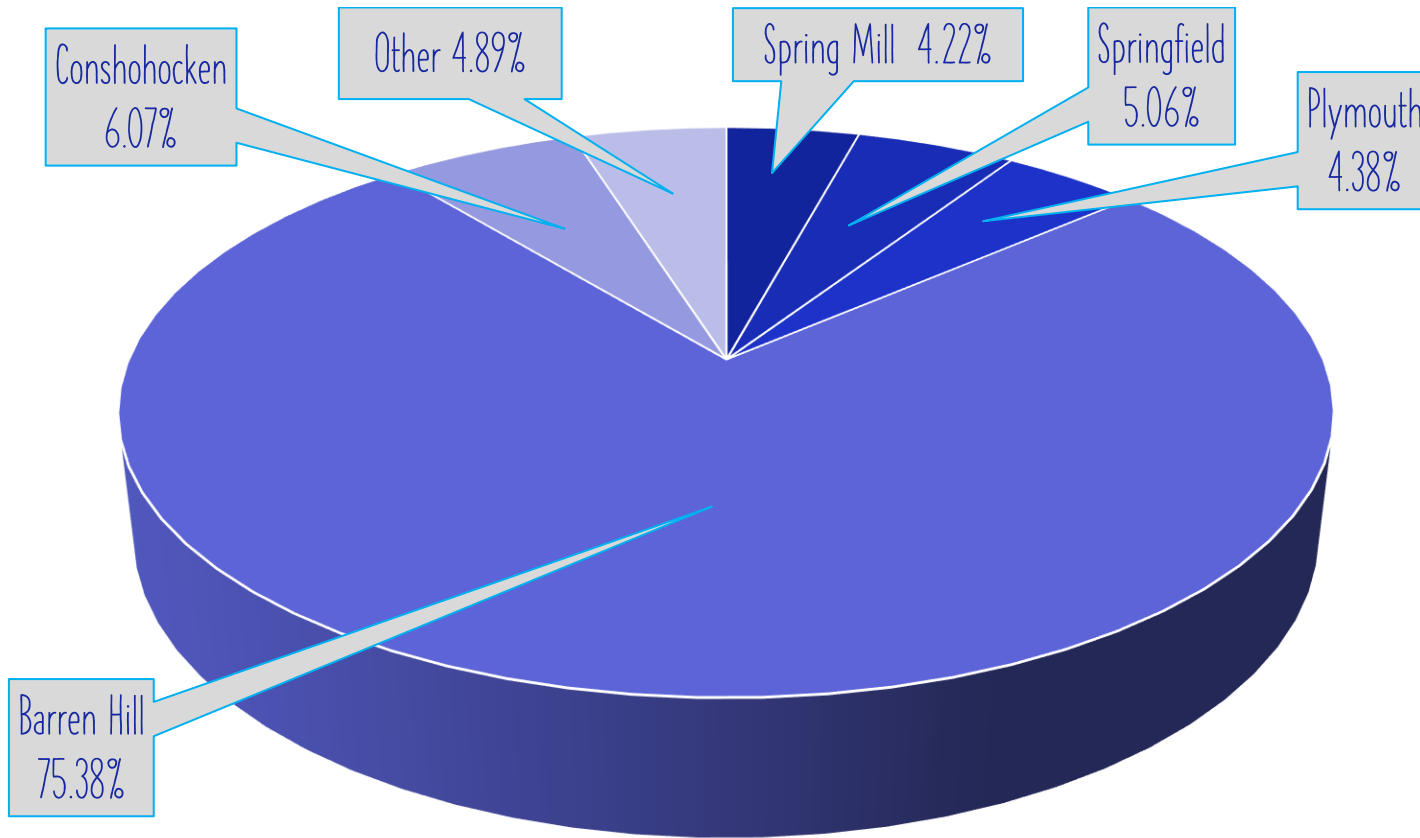
Mutual Aid



To ensure the proper number of firefighters respond to a dispatched emergency, the fire service relies on mutual aid assistance from nearby fire companies and communities. BHVFC's response district regularly relies on mutual aid fire companies from Conshohocken Borough, Plymouth Township, Whitpain Township, Ambler Borough, Upper Dublin Township, and Springfield Township. Any agency may request mutual aid assistance, and BHVFC responds wherever we are called. BHVFC regularly provides RAPID INTERVENTION TEAM service to Norristown and was dispatched as far away as Warrington Township, Bucks County, in 2024.

24.62% of responses (146 Calls for Service) were in support of our Mutual Aid partners.

75.38% of responses were in BHVFC's primary response district in Whitemarsh Township.

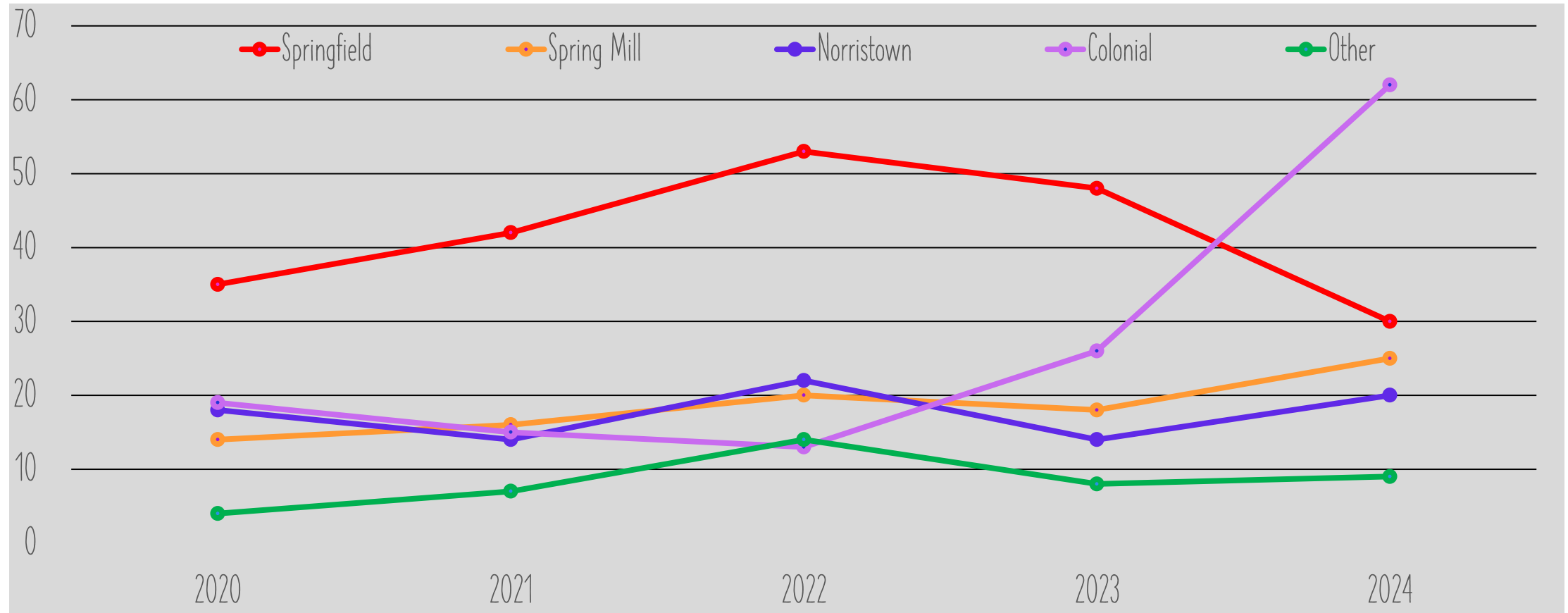

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Weekly Training Exercises



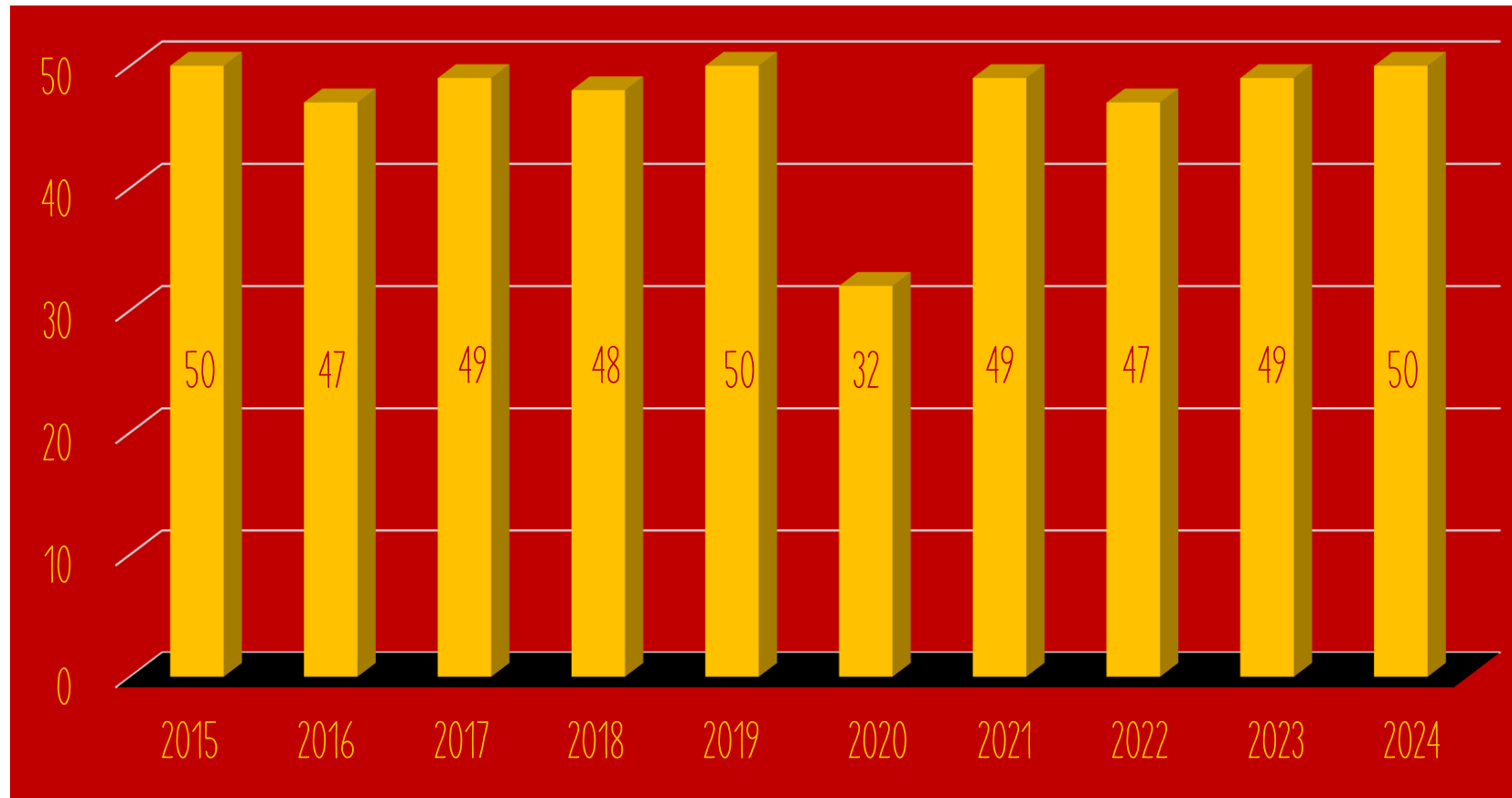
Weekly training exercises occur on Monday nights. Members meet and train on varying fire service disciplines with their fellow volunteers. Training is delivered annually through a mix of annual qualifications and standards, hands-on operations, and classroom lectures. These weekly training exercises allow our volunteers to know, understand, and recognize each other's abilities, strengths, and weaknesses.

The responsibility of the operational leadership team of the Fire Company is to ensure that our volunteers are mission-ready each time they are called upon for service. Amongst many other hats that he wears in the Fire Company, Assistant Chief Scott Yoder is also the Training Chief. On a weekly basis, Assistant Chief Yoder plans and prepares a weekly training exercise to teach, test, and master the skills of the profession for each of our volunteers. His vast network of training colleagues has reaped benefits to our membership, and many of our mutual aid and other first responder partners.

Assistant Chief Yoder has a passion for training firefighters and a vision for future generations that ensures they will be prepared. Well known in the firefighting Community, the members of the Barren Hill Fire Company are blessed to have this incredible talent as part of our leadership team.

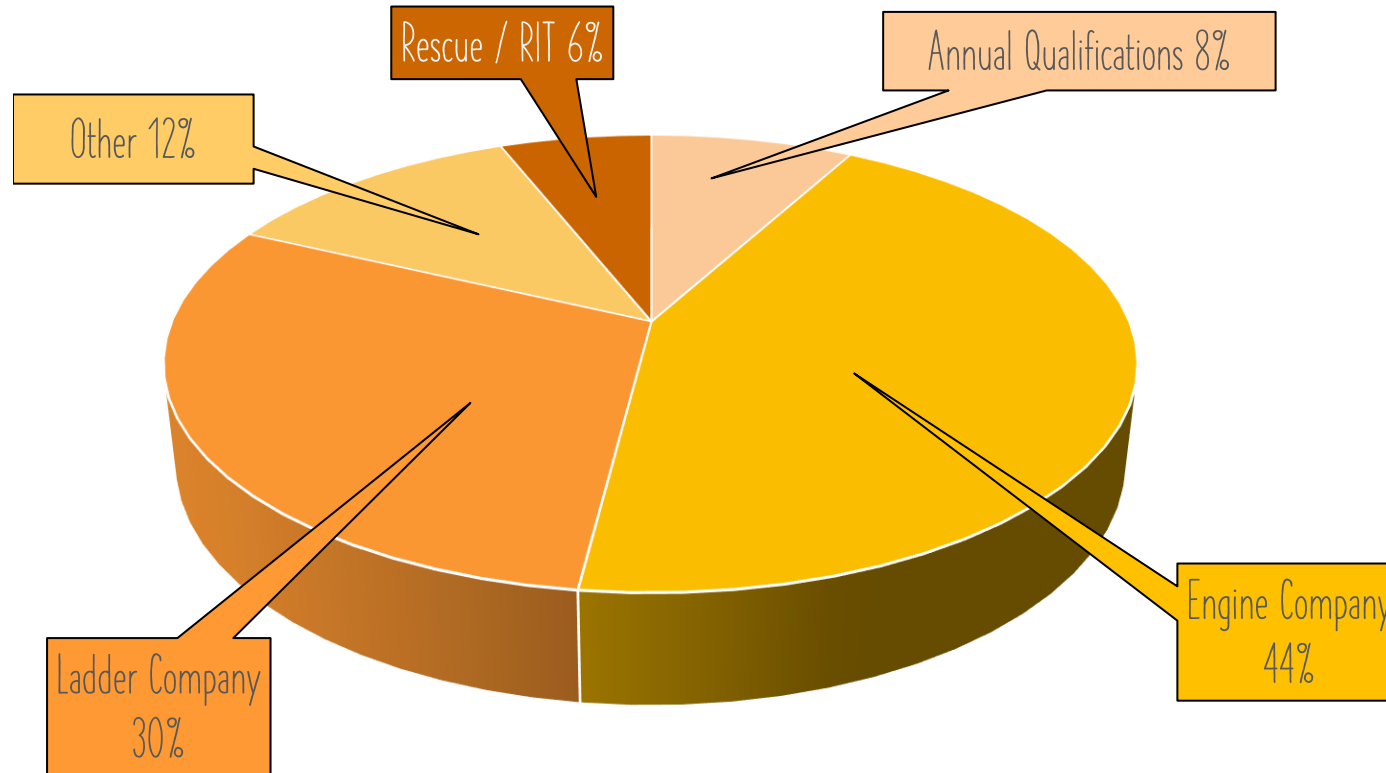

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Weekly Training Exercise Topic



The Barren Hill Volunteer Fire Company trains on Monday nights beginning at 6:45 pm. During these exercises, members have the opportunity to work with other volunteers, learning each other's capabilities and the tools of our trade. Many Monday night training exercises bring us together with our mutual aid partners to train together, learn together, and grow together. Training never stops and members from the newest to most experienced constantly hone their skills to ensure that our mission readiness is never in doubt.

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Vehicle Rescue Certification



In March 2024, 15 volunteers embarked on the 40-hour, NFPA Vehicle Rescue Awareness and Operations Certification Course. This rigorous classroom and practical training allows our members to be prepared when called upon. For some, this was new training that they had never experienced before. For others, this was a refresher and provided an update on current rescue trends and methods. Regardless of whether new or a refresher, this notch in our tool belt is just one more example of how our volunteers continue to train, hone our skills, and be better in service for our Community!

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Regional Training Exercise



On July 10, 2024, BHVFC gathered with eleven other fire companies, more than 100 firefighters, in the Fort Washington section of Whitemarsh to train at an acquired structure that was slated for demolition. Crews worked together at several stations, working in teams on ventilation, search, roof operations, hose line advancement, and most importantly, TOGETHER!

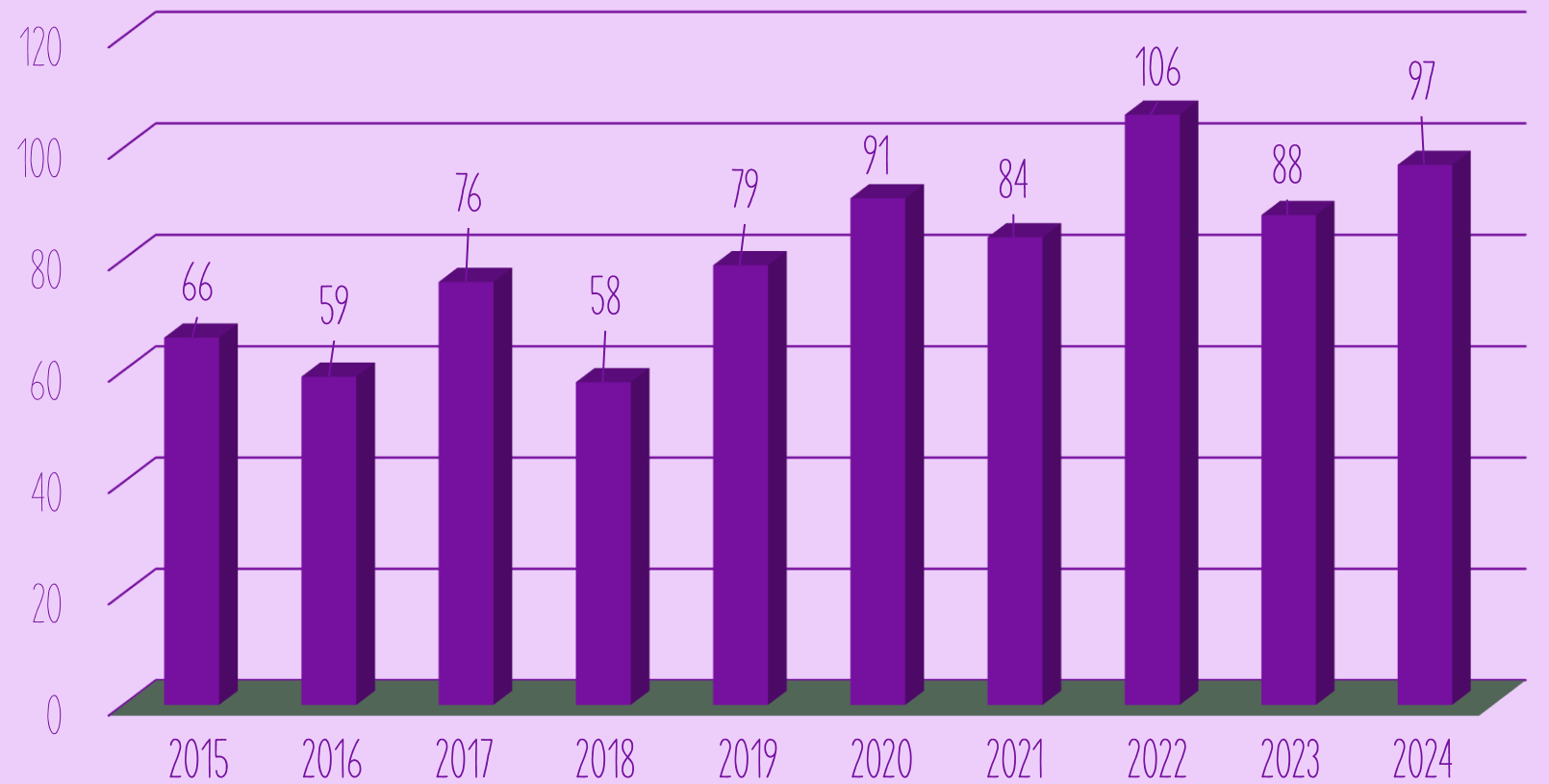
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Special Services – 10yr Comparison

This chart shows the annual Fire Company Special Service events for the last 10 years.



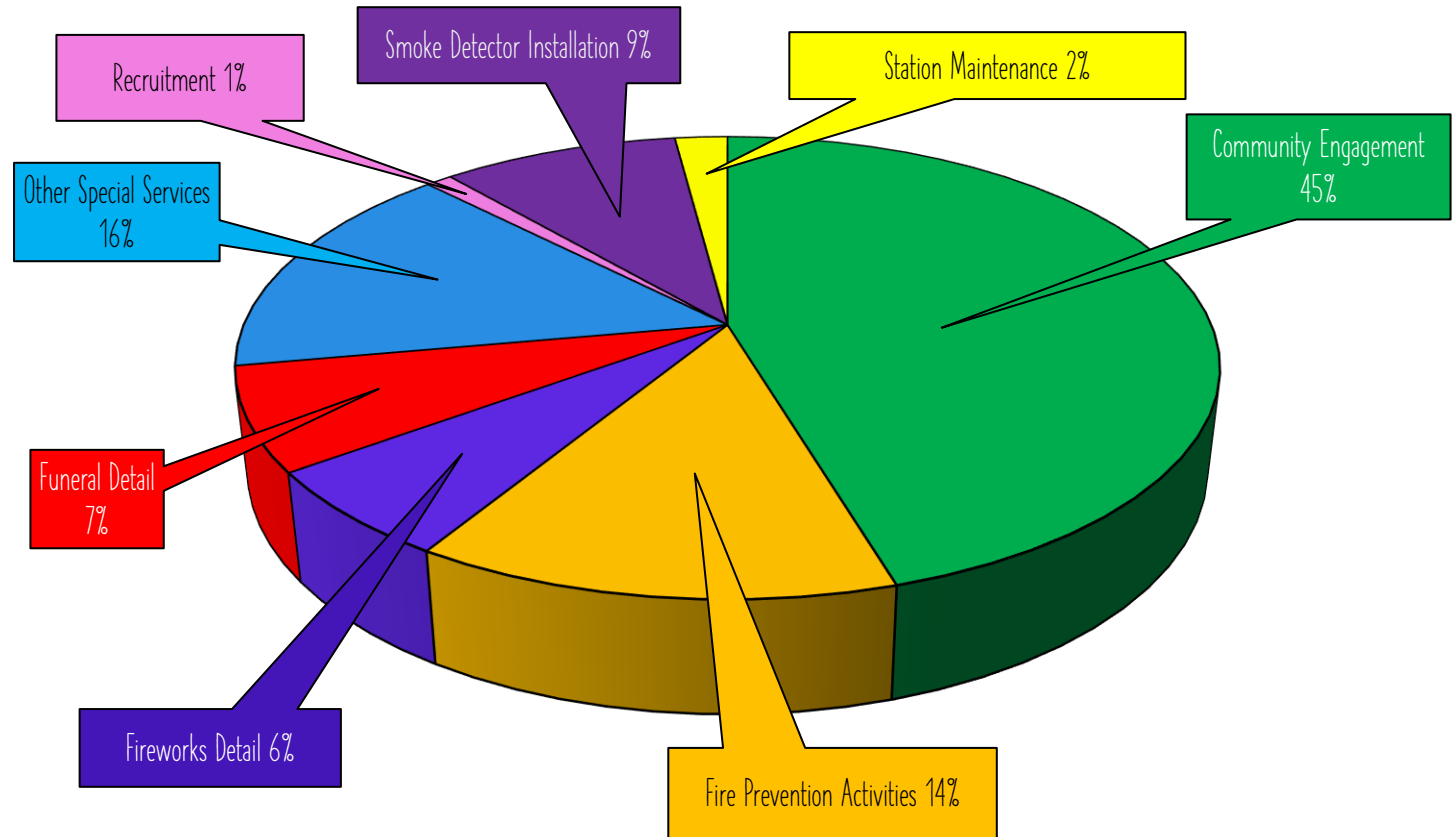

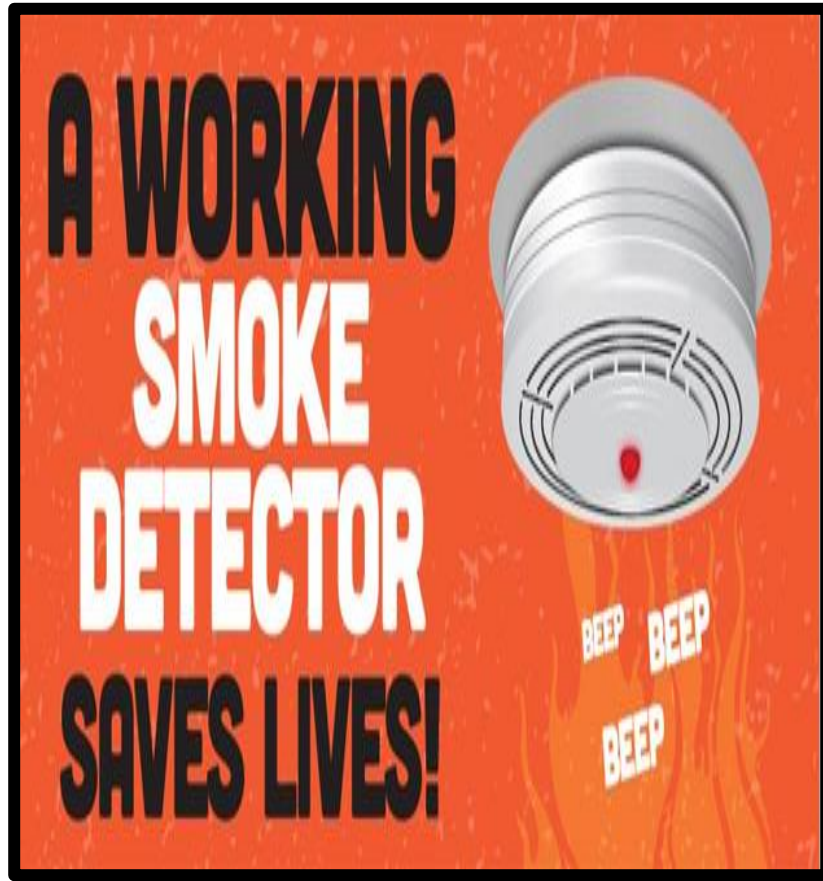
In 2024, our members participated in 97 Special Services representing 2,707.5 hours of service. Our special Services are broken down into eight (8) categories:

The Barren Hill Volunteer Fire Company participates in the Operation 6abc Save-A-Life Smoke Detector Installation program. In conjunction with the Township Fire Marshal's Office, our career staff installed nearly fifty (50) smoke detectors in Whitemarsh Township residences in 2024.

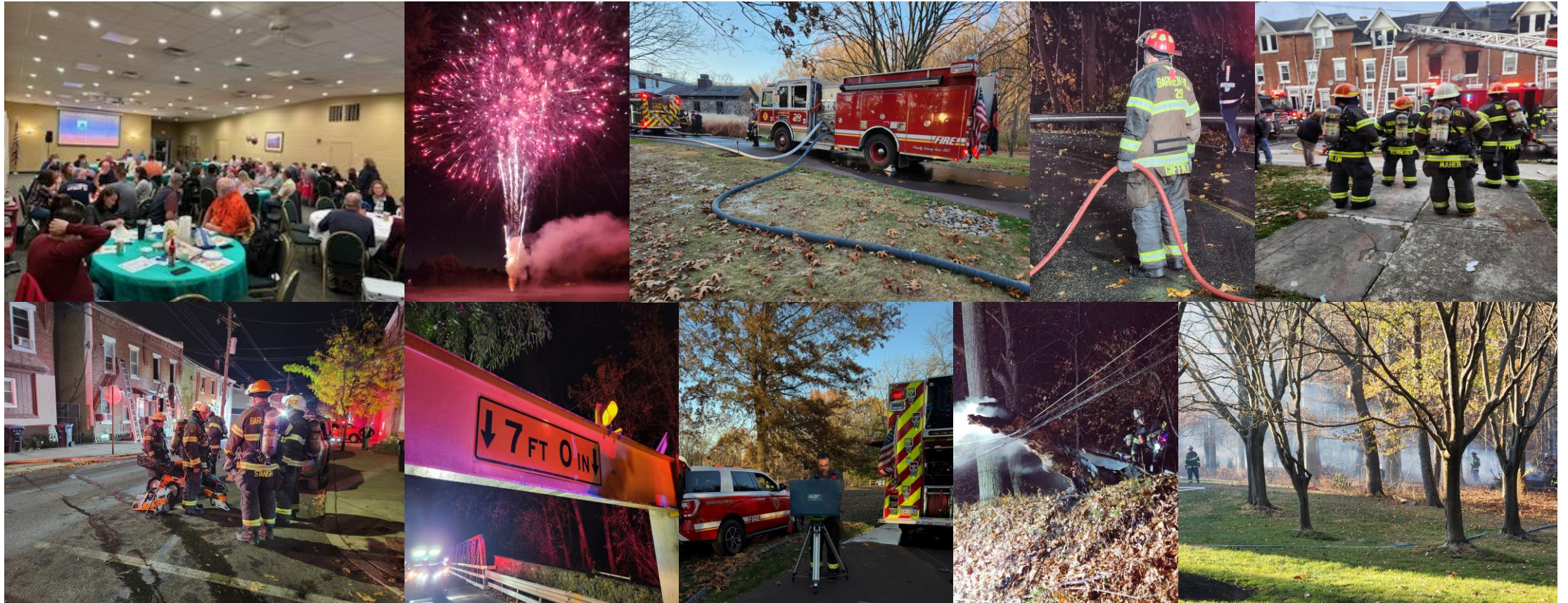

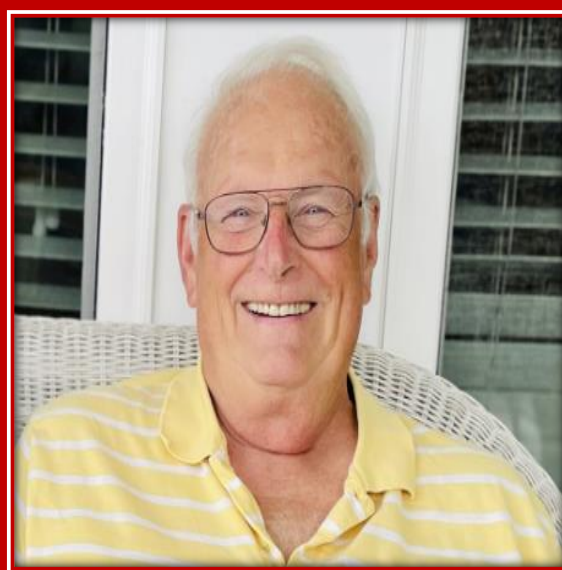


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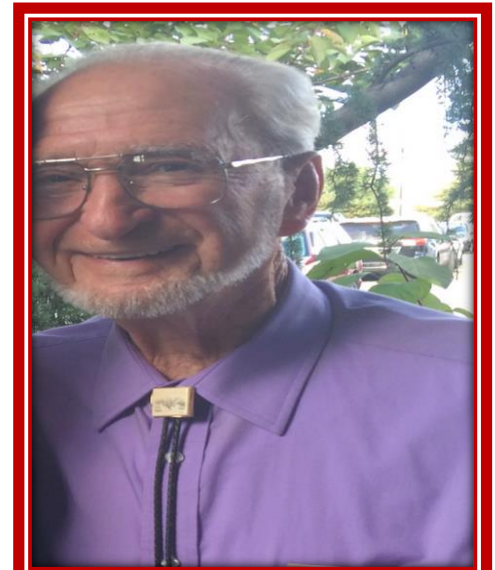

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Municipal & County Property Tax Credits



Are you tired of paying property taxes?

The Whitemarsh Township Board of Supervisors has approved an ordinance enacting a property tax credit for active volunteers. Active Volunteers can receive a 25%, 50%, 75%, or 100% tax credit based on their participation and service to the Community.

The Montgomery County Commissioners also approved an ordinance enacting a property tax credit for active volunteers. The County Ordinance also offers active volunteers a 25%, 50%, 75% or 100% tax credit based on their participation and service to the Community.

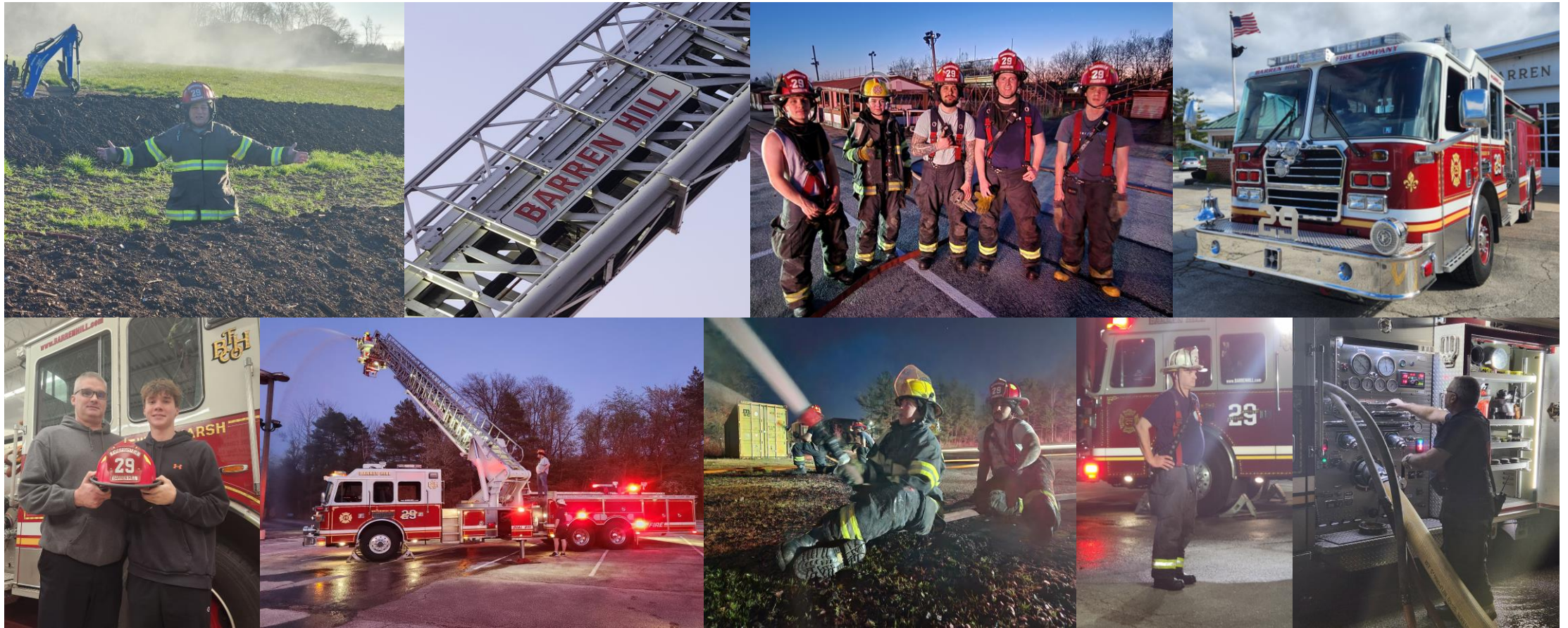
The Words Spoken at our Annual Awards Banquet: "Two years ago, the fire company embarked on a program to transition our report management system from Firehouse Software to a new company, Imagetrend. This included the transfer of thousands of records to maintain our databases. Bucky handled this transition, vetting numerous RMS companies, evaluating systems that would work best with our organization, and ultimately writing computer programs to modify the RMS systems to meet our requirements and necessities. Moving forward to last year, when we learned of the passing of Municipal and County ordinances for property tax credits for our volunteers. While these tax credits offer tremendous thanks to our volunteers for their service, the data that needs to be compiled is plentiful. No tax credits are on the same yearly calendar schedule, and awards are similar but slightly different. This past year, Bucky has conservatively spent more than 500 hours writing software programs and testing the report data, all to ensure that the data is easily collected for each program, which will ultimately allow our volunteers to receive these most deserved tax credits. Bucky, this is all work behind the scenes that does not take into consideration your calls for service, training, special services, and vice-presidential duties. I am grateful, and our Volunteers are grateful. Tonight, you are publicly recognized for this exceptional service."

This Meritorious Award stated: "In recognition of your dedication, commitment, and sacrifice to the Barren Hill Volunteer Fire Company to transfer the old records management system to the new software platform AND ensure that tax credits for our Volunteers are easily calculated and awarded. Your more than 200 hours compiling data, developing computer codes, testing, and retesting the new programs do not go unnoticed by the Leadership and the Volunteers of our Organization.

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Apparatus Committee

In 2022, the apparatus committee was charged with planning and preparing specifications for the replacement of the Fire Company's 1997 Sutphen Tower Ladder. The committee spent the next 18 months meeting with apparatus manufacturers before making a recommendation for purchase to the Company in June 2023. On June 10, 2023, the fire company placed an order with the Sutphen Corporation for a new Tower Ladder. Delivery is expected in 2026.

In March 2024, the committee traveled to Columbus, Ohio where a pre-construction meeting was held, and final modifications were considered. To date, the committee has spent hours upon hours in meetings, reviewing proposals, asking questions, researching components, all for the benefit of the next 25 years of service to Whitemarsh.

Throughout this process, the apparatus committee has remained focused on the needs of the community, and what components of the new truck would best serve Whitemarsh Township for the next 25 years. We are excited for the Spring of 2026!

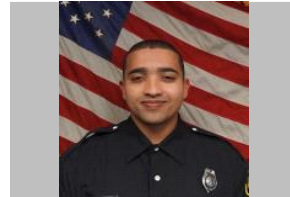
